SEPTEMBER

- 10 The Council convenes a week early at Rye Beach.
- 14 45 Football players relinquish the last few days of summer for early practice.
- 16 Masters Meeting — The new masters are: Fr. F. X. Moan, Sacred Studies; Mr. D. R. Knickerbocker, Sacred Studies; Rev. D. M. Dunbar, Sacred Studies; Mr. R. P. Davis, history; Mr. W. S. Adams, math; Mr. J. E. Palin, trainer; Mr. S. B. Sturges, French; Mr. Oates is on sabbatical; Rev. J. Walker has left SPS for a position at the National Episcopal Church in Washington; and over the summer the Potters added to their family a girl, Paige Meyer.
- 17 6th Form returns early for case studies.
- 20 117 New Boys register.
- 21 Old boys return. School registration is now officially at 449.
- 22 Classes begin.
- 24 President John Landes addresses the School in Memorial Hall.

OCTOBER

- 1 Soccer defeats Groton 3-0; Football loses to the big G 14-6.
- 5 Soccer ties KUA 1-1.
- 6 Chilly Cricket Holiday. New boys depart for Hampton beach. The Ocean temperature was 46, too cold even for the Rector.
- 8 Soccer loses to Mt. Hermon 3-0; Football loses to Milton 44-14; Cross Country loses to Proctor. A bad day for all.
- 12 Soccer downs Exeter for its umpteenth straight time 1-0. Cross Country defeats Tilton.
- 14 Premiere of the Fall play — "The Apple Cart." Edith Sitwell's "Facade" preceded the performance. Parent's Weekend begins. Also Trustee Weekend.
- 15 Mr. A. Cox, retired Solicitor General, visits school as first Conroy Fellow. Soccer takes Browne & Nichols 1-0. Vermont Academy overcomes Football 43-8, but loses to Harriers.
- 16 End of Busy Weekend for everyone.
- 19 Soccer comes from behind to defeat Governor Dummer 3-2 while SPS Cross Country loses to G. D.
- 21 Harriers are easily defeated by top ranking high school — Concord High.
- 22 Soccer continues strong by defeating New Hampton 2-1 (overtime). Football also continues strong by losing its fourth straight. Magician Paul Fleming entertains the little ones.
- 26 SPS Soccer for the first time in many years comes close to Andover by tying them 1-1. Both goals were scored in the overtime with the blue "A" tickling the twine first. Cross Country loses to Andover 22-56.

- 29 Soccer—Brooks 5-SPS 0 (no comment); Football wins its first one by defeating Winchendon 34-18. CC loses to New Hampton.
- 31 Soccer downs Tilton on a rainy day 3-1.

NOVEMBER

- 5 Soccer 2-Dublin 2; Football loses to Lawrence. Cross Country placed fifth in the Interscholastics held at Moses Brown.
- 6 The Curtis String Quartet plays at the Library.
- 9 SPS Soccer easily downs Dartmouth Freshmen 5-2. Star center Christos Alexopoulos scores his tenth goal with two seconds remaining thus matching the number on his jersey.
- 10 Mr. Amory Houghton '45 replaces Mr. William B. Moore '33 as Trustee President.
- 11 Dance Weekend.
- 12 Football continues its losing streak by succumbing to Brooks 26-12.
- 13 Girls depart.
- 17 The Malcolm Kenneth Gordon Hockey Rink is dedicated.
- 23 School departs for T-day holiday.
- 27 School reluctantly returns.

DECEMBER

- 3 College Boards. Hockey wins its first game in the new rink. SPS 8-Concord High 3.
- 15 Examinations Begin.
- 12 Christmas Pageant.
- 14 Homeward Bound. Hockey defeats Exeter at the Garden 2-1 and goes on to place third at Lawrenceville.

JANUARY

- 3 School returns. Hockey practice begins on all rinks.
- 8 Ralph Pottle Brass Quartet performs to a small but appreciative audience.
- 11 Basketball overwhelms Winchendon 47-29; squash loses to Harvard 2-3; and hockey trounced by Deerfield 6-0.
- 14 College boards — a long, long day.
- 18 Hockey and squash win. Pit loses to Lawrence.
- 20 Conroy Fellow, Mr. Aaron Copland, shakes up upper forms with ideas on way-out music.
- 21 All teams lose. Squash to Brooks. Hockey to Milton. Basketball to St. Mark's.
- 25 St. Paul's Day. Holiday takes its toll: Racquet men beaten by Andover, Dartmouth Freshmen shellacks hockey 8-2, and Brooks noses out basketball 50-46. Skiers the only winners, 195-189 over Holderness.
- 28 Dramatic Club presents superb performance of "Caesar." Hockey over Hebron 4-3 and pitmen lose a close one to Groton 48-47.

FEBRUARY

- 1 Skiers over Dublin 195-186. Squash takes Brooks 5-2. Hockey ties Exeter in cliff hanger 1-1.
- 4 Squash drops to Middlesex 4-3, and hockey humiliated by Belmont Hill 6-0. Skiers place second in meet with Andover and Proctor. Sixth Form show — *The Iliad* — has love, violence, and literary grunts.
- 8 Before capacity crowd SPS Debating team defeats Exeter. Squash, skiing and hockey also successful.
- 10 Lovelies arrive for Dance Weekend and watch hockey team nose out Yale Freshmen. Birkhead lecturer, Dr. Woodrow Wilson Sayre, mountain climber, relates attack on Mt. Everest.
- 15 Skiers again handle Holderness, but basketball and squash dwarfed by Andover and Governor Dummer. Hockey successful.
- 18 SPS humiliated by Andover in hockey 10-0. Basketball stopped cold by Browne & Nichols 69-50. Luckily squash takes Deerfield 4-1.
- 19 School saddened by death of Mr. Henry Crocker Kittredge, sixth Rector of the School.
- 22 All teams win. Middlesex squash 7-0 and basketball 37-35. Hockey over KUA 7-2.
- 25 Interscholastic squash here. SPS ties for 6th place. Hockey ends season with victory over Bowdoin 7-2. Basketball drops last one to Roxbury Latin 64-38.

FEBRUARY

- 26 Lower School officially celebrates its seventy-fifth birthday, Professor Arnott presents marionette performance of "Oedipus Tyrannus." Fiske Cup Preliminaries, through March 1st.
- 28 National Merit Tests.

MARCH

- 4 College Boards nail V formers.
- 10 Bicycle proposal is passed. Sixth form can ride to town.
- 11 SPS entertains Abbott Glee Club Concert.
- 14 Twenty House's "Leader" wins Fiske Cup finals.
- 16 School departs for Spring Vacation.

APRIL

- 4 School returns to compare tans.
- 5 First crews splash through rain, ice, and snow on the Contoocook River.
- 19 B-Ball takes Bishop Brady 9-2 in season opener. Tufts falls to Lax 10-3.
Dr. Mary Calderone, Conroy Fellow, speaks with surprising frankness on sex.

- 21 School mourns the passing of Dr. Channing Lefebvre, who was school organist and choir master for twenty years.
- 22 Track team places fifth in Exeter relays. Lacrosse beaten by Exeter 7-2. Baseball subdued by Belmont Hill 8-7.
- 23 V form elects Ryck King, Ben Maguire, Ewing Walker, and Oivind Lorentzen.
- 26 Lax takes Lawrence 7-1. Baseball subdues Proctor 8-2.
- 27 Scientific and Language Societies' dinners.
- 29 Lacrosse takes New Hampton 7-0. Track dumped by Milton 87-44 and Concord over B-Ball 9-4.

MAY

- 3 Baseball over Kimball Union 8-4. Deerfield leaves Lax in the dust 8-4. Andover overpowers tennis 9-0, but track wins triangle meet with KUA and New Hampton.
- 5 Berwick bows to baseball 4-3 and Winchendon snowed in lacrosse 10-2.
- 6 *An Enemy of the People* produced by Dramatic Society after a grueling afternoon of College boards.
- 10 Lacrossemen successful against Proctor 10-5 and baseball over Nobles 10-6. Tennis loses to Exeter 7-1.
- 12 Dance weekend. Mr. Earle Hilficher, biologist and teacher, gives Birkhead Lecture on Beavers and the animal life which surrounds beaver ponds.
- 13 Bill Talbert, tennis champion, holds tennis clinic. Halcyon and Shattucks easily take Mount Hermon Varsity and JV crews. Milton downed in tennis 10-8. Track loses to Concord 94-37. Baseball over New Hampton and Lacrosse over Holderness 4-1.
- 15 Advanced Placement week. First crews row at crack of dawn.
- 17 Easy win for all crews over Andover. Lacrosse stuns KUA 6-1 while baseball nosed out by Tilton 9-8. Governor Dummer downs tennis 6½-2½.
- 20 Halcyon first and second easy victors over Dartmouth third varsity heavyweights. Shattucks repeat performance over Freshmen Lightweights. Tennis takes Groton 10-8. Lax loses to Governor Dummer and Tilton overwhelms track 107-27.
- 23 Stone Rollers complete path around Lower School Pond. Mr. Hart in charge of three year project.
- 24 Tennis and Lacrosse subdued by New Hampton and Andover by 5½-3½ and 4-3. Baseball takes Groton 3-0. Third and fourth crew easily take Exeter first clubs.
- 27 Worcester Regatta. All crews reach finals. Shattuck first places second.
- 28 Missionary Society holds auction that brings in about 150 dollars. Among many worthless articles sold, a Lower Schooler was put on the block.
- 30 Memorial Day.
- 31 Lower School boat races. Shattucks sweep all five.

JUNE

- 2 Exams begin for entire school.
- 3 Anniversary activities begin. Trustees meet at the School. Track meet is won by OH and Charlie Pillsbury '65 wins Alumni Dash. Crew Races: Shattucks 1 and 7 Halcyons 2-3-4-5-6. S. K. Barker wins Gordon Medal.
- 9 Exams end!
- 10 VI Form Communion. Presentation of Dickey prizes and testimonials forms I through V takes place in the Hall. Last Night Service and hand shaking complete first day of commencement activities.
- 11 School and guests watch handsome Sixth Formers graduate.
